

Csaba & Lisa Leidenfrost

Born to missionary parents and raised in Liberia, Csaba ("Chaw-ba") feels more at home in Africa than in the USA. He is an elder at Christ Church, Moscow, Idaho, and was commissioned by her for the work of Bible translation among the Bakwé people of Ivory Coast. Since 1988 Csaba, Lisa and family have lived with the Bakwé in their remote village with few western conveniences. Lisa successfully home-schooled their four children in this setting - a feat not without its challenges. Living among the Bakwé was an important part of the Leidenfrost's ministry as biblical teaching about the family could be lived out in practical obedience. Csaba now continues to work on the translation remotely and travels there twice a year while his children finish high-school and college.



Jacques (Jack) Fuhrmann

came to know the Lord in the US Army during Desert Storm in 1990 in Saudia Arabia. While there he felt the Lord calling him

to return one day to the Muslim world with a Bible instead of a gun. The Lord sent Jack, Kim and family to Chad, Africa to serve among an unreached Muslim group in 1999. For seven years they learned the language and culture. Jack served as team leader for all the IMB/SBC missionaries in the country. He worked to unify evangelical missionaries with hearts for Muslims, and Arabs in particular. The Gospel become available to Arab speakers in Chad and beyond, through translations and audio recordings for the 98% illiterate people. In 2006, God led the Fuhrmann family back to the US where they currently minister through their all-natural farm in Gretna, VA.

Hemlines should be at or below the knee. Dances are lively, and you should be able to move freely. Shoes that do not slip off work well.
